Safer Internet Day 2018

Once again we celebrated Safer Internet Day throughout school on February 6th. Online Safety is something we continually work on at Laurel Avenue; we don't just focus on its importance once a year. However, Safer Internet Day is a good opportunity to discuss how it is essential that we are safe and kind whilst using technology. Our Safer Internet Day assembly will be delivered by school's Online Safety Group this week. The group, made up of children in Reception to Year 6, will deliver a very important message, asking children to think about:

'Create, Connect and Share respect: A better internet starts with you.'








Class 2 learned about how to be safe online and why it is important that we are safe. They made posters to tell others how to be safe and planned some writing. Later this week they will be writing instructions for younger children about how they can keep safe online. Class 2 thought it was important that they shared what they had learned with their younger brothers and sisters and any other younger children they know.


Class 1 talked about positive language to use when we speak to each other, including communicating when online, during their 'Compliment Circle' time. They also created Online Safety posters and helped Smartie the Penguin make kind choices whilst using the internet.



Class 3 focused on how they could make someone feel by words and actions online. They carried out lots of fun activities which allowed them to think about how their online actions could cause upset or happiness. They created posters and wrote poems about online safety to try and help them share the important message with others.







Class 4 discussed the online influences and pressures faced by young people today. They looked at the positive and negative influences from social media and how we all can deal with these. #IamhappyasIam Class 4 also discussed ways to make sure all connections online with friends are positive and created posters encouraging others to connect and share with respect online.

All children in school have taken part in lessons this half term about spending and saving money. The important financial literacy sessions have looked at needs and wants and borrowing and saving. Through these sessions, key maths skills have also been developed alongside an understanding of how to manage our money. All children should have brought home



information on how we teach financial capability education across the year and a leaflet on this term's topic of spending and saving. If you did not receive a copy then the information can be found on the school website along with information on the Credit Union savings scheme we offer in school.

Credit Union Savings Account

If you would like your child to open a savings account, then please follow these simple steps:

- 1. Complete the form you received during My Money Week (or download it from the website/ask for a new form from the office). You start with completing your child's details and then your own, as a trustee of their account. There will need to be an identity check carried out, but this can be done simply online, as long as you tick the yes box. You do not need to bring any identification into school. It is only your identity that will be checked online, nothing else. Then sign the form and send it into school with your child. Please don't send any savings into school yet.
- 2. We will then ask you to send money into school with your child and their account will be opened. They will receive a bank book showing their total which they will bring home with them. This bank book will need to be brought in to school with their savings weekly. It doesn't matter how much or how little is saved.

Children are able to take money out of their account whenever they like.

The banking is carried out on a set day each week – Tuesday– however, end of the week Nursery children may bring their savings into school and their money will be kept securely in the safe until the following Tuesday.

Adults can have a Saver Account too. If an adult would like to open an account, please collect a form from the office to complete before opening your account.

Class 3 learned all about loans, debt and savings during My Money Week. They helped the Deacon family to work out which family activities would be most cost effective, and whether the family could afford to take out a loan in order to replace their broken TV. During Maths lessons, they carried out lots of reasoning and problem solving activities involving money. All of their knowledge from the week was used whilst writing a non-chronological report about loans, debts and savings.







Class 4 looked at how interest rates are calculated for both savings and loans and the real cost of borrowing money. During their maths sessions they focused on the addition and subtraction of money involving decimals and on finding possibilities of spending certain amounts.



Athletics

Class 3 took part in a Gymnastics Festival at Durham City Gymnastics Club.

They enjoyed a whole range of gymnastic activities including trampolining, working on a balance beam, a horse and an assault course.

As always, their fantastic behaviour was commented on as children in Class 3 were excellent representatives of the school.



Children in Year 1 and 2 also enjoyed attending a Gymnastics Festival at Durham City Gymnastics Club. They had the opportunity to try a range of different activities and everyone had a fantastic and thoroughly enjoyable time!



The Playground Leaders have had a busy time lately! They have received leadership training from a Sports Coach and have been involved in the planning of new activities for lunchtimes.

Class 4 Visit to The Oriental Museum

Class 4 Visited the Oriental Museum and took part in an Early Islamic Civilisation workshop. During their visit, they looked at artefacts in the museum from the Islamic Empire and had the opportunity to work as historians describing them and using them to gain an insight into life over 1100 years ago. Class 4 then worked in small groups to create a ceramic tile display inspired by the patterns and shapes they had observed in the Islamic art, pottery and jewellery. The afternoon session involved a dramatisation of 'Sherazade' from 'Arabian Nights' and then a chance to learn more about the 'Baghdad House of Wisdom' and how scientists and mathematicians invented many instruments and systems we use today.









RAINBOW CHALLENGE

Class 1 have started their exciting and fun Rainbow Challenge.



The children are encouraged to complete a task in each of the 7 different areas in their classroom. For each task they complete they receive a coloured lolly stick and once they have completed all 7 tasks they receive a certificate and prize in Star Assembly. They start new challenges every 2 weeks. The rainbow challenge encourages children to be more independent and to develop skills in all areas of the curriculum.




